



The following events appear in Blackfish at approximately the indicated times:

- 1. [00:14:20] Tilikum is captured off Iceland
- 2. [00:18:21] Kelty Byrne is killed at Sealand BC
- 3. [00:29:10] Katina harasses Tilikum when he first arrives at Orlando
- 4. [00:35:44] Katina gives birth to Kalina --1st captive born orca to survive
- 5. [00:37:30] Kalina is transferred, Katina cries
- 6. [00:38:25] Takara is transferred, Kasatka cries
- . [00:43:35] Kandu 5 dies after a fight with Corky 2
- 8. [00:45:40] John Sillick is crushed by Orky 2
- 9. [00:47:28] Tamaree is pulled into the water by Orkid and Splash
- 10. [00:49:12] Shamu doesn't like being ridden by person in bathing suit
- 11. [00:50:45] Ken Peters is pulled under water by Kasatka
- 12. [00:55:15] Daniel Dukes is killed by Tilikum
- 13. [01:04:50] Alexis Martinez is killed at Loro Parque by Keto
- 14. [01:06:40] Dawn Brancheau is killed by Tilikum

They are denoted on the timeline, on the opposite page, as red balls with a corresponding number.

Petting Pool Years: at SeaWorld San Diego, recent captives were rotated 2 at a time through the dolphin petting pool, while they were in training. Over this time, tens of thousands of visitors could interact quite freely with these orcas. The orcas befriended repeat visitors and could recognize them among crowds of hundreds. They thrived on trust and respect and were gentle, playful, mischievous, and affectionate, sometimes beaching themselves in a shallow area for rubdowns. Of note, they would invite their human friends to join them in the pool. If a friend was willing to let an orca mouth a hand or arm, the orca would pull his friend towards the water. The orca always let go before his friend actually fell in. This was an established behavior of these orcas, Kasatka included, prior to the events of Blackfish.

Within 3 to 7 years of leaving their petting pool experience, these orcas began to exhibit the dangerous behaviors noted in the graphed incidents. These orcas went from a history of friendly and gentle behavior to being the major part of SeaWorld's most aggressive and incident prone orcas. Some of their children and children's children are also in this incident prone group.
